Follow these easy steps to check for leaks:



- Visually inspect faucets, pipes, and plumbing fixtures. Listen for the sound of running water – many leaks can be detected by sound and sight.
- Drop a dye tablet* in your toilet tank as a quick and easy way to identify leaks. If color appears in the toilet bowl without flushing, you have a leak.



- Twist and tighten pipe connections. Save even more water without a noticeable difference in flow by installing a WaterSense labeled faucet aerator or showerhead.
- Examine your lawn for wet spots where the grass seems greener. This could mean a broken underground pipe.
- If you believe your water meter is leaking, do not open the meter box. Instead, call the Board of Water Supply at 748-5000.
